

## 9 . Education

The Japanese education system consists of 6 years of elementary school, 3 years of junior high school, 3 years of senior high school and 4 years of university. The first 9 years of education are compulsory. There are national, public and private schools for each educational institution . The school year begins in April and ends in March the following year. There are nursery schools and kindergartens for children below the school age. For graduates from junior and senior high school, there are various technical and vocational schools. There are also special schools for the blind, the deaf and handicapped people. For people who wish to do further study or research, there are graduate schools.

### 1.Nursery School (Day Care Center)

When parents cannot take care of their child because they both work or because of illness, the child can be sent to a nursery school. The nursery school fees are set based on the previous year's income of each family.

Age: From 0 to below the age for elementary school entry (6 years of age)

### 2.Kindergarten

Each municipality has a kindergarten for pre-elementary aged children, to prepare them for elementary education. Unlike nursery schools, education time is set at 4 hours a day in general.

Age : From 3 to below the entry age for elementary school (6 years of age)

Application and inquiry: School education section in the Board of Education of each municipality (For private kindergartens, inquire directly at the kindergarten)

### 3.Elementary School / Junior High School

In Japan, compulsory education consists of 6 years at elementary school and 3 years at junior high school. Foreign children have no legal obligation to attend a Japanese school, but are eligible for admission to public schools. The school year is divided into 3 terms; from April to July, September to December and January to March. Transferring students can enter during the middle of a term. National and public school days are 5 days a week from

Monday through Friday. Admission fee, school fees and textbooks are free at national and public schools. However, guardians are responsible to pay for teaching aids (excluding textbooks) and other expenses like school equipment and excursions.

Most elementary and junior high schools provide lunch (called “ Kyu-shoku ”), which the guardians have to pay for in part. Although there is no uniform at elementary school, there is a designated gymnastic uniform. At junior high school, each school has a different school uniform and gymnastic uniform.

At junior high school, there are 2 types of club activities. There are sports clubs for soccer, baseball, basketball, volleyball and tennis, and cultural clubs for activities such as wind instrument music and art. Every student is free to choose whether to join, but most students join some club in what they're interested in. They have club activities after school, and some clubs hold pre-matches and attend official matches on Sundays and during the summer vacation.

There are many school events throughout the year, such as sports day. There are also days for parents to visit the school and observe their child's class. Please try and participate in school activities as much as possible. In addition, each school has a PTA (Parents and Teachers Association), which is to promote communication between the parents and teachers to deepen an understanding of the children's development.

Age: Elementary school: from ages 6 to 12

Junior high school: from ages 12 to 15

#### 4.Senior High School

There are 3 types of high schools: national, public and private. Generally, courses are divided into normal curriculum, vocational-training course and other courses. The vocational-training course and other courses, specialized fields such as agricultural, technical, commerce, international, musical, art and science and mathematics are taught. High school consists of a 3-year education. In Shizuoka prefecture, there is only 1 technical college with a 5-year education system in Numazu City.

After graduating junior high school, only students who pass the entrance examination are admitted to high school. The entrance examinations for private school are held in the beginning of February, for public schools it is held in the beginning of March.

At high school, many students join club activities. They belong to a sports or cultural club, have practice and matches after school, on weekends and during summer vacation.

Age: Over 15(have graduated from junior high school in Japan or a foreign country)

## 5.University/ Junior College

Universities and junior colleges are divided into national, public and private. University education is 4 years (6 years at medical, dental and veterinary school) and 2 years for Junior College. The academic year begins on April 1st and ends on March 31st. Most universities adopt the semester system. The 1st semester (from April to September) and 2nd semester (from September to March) are divided by a summer vacation.

Admission fee, tuition fees, school curriculum and entrance examination all vary with each university and faculty. National and public universities are financially supported by the national and municipal government; therefore, the school fees are cheaper than at private universities.

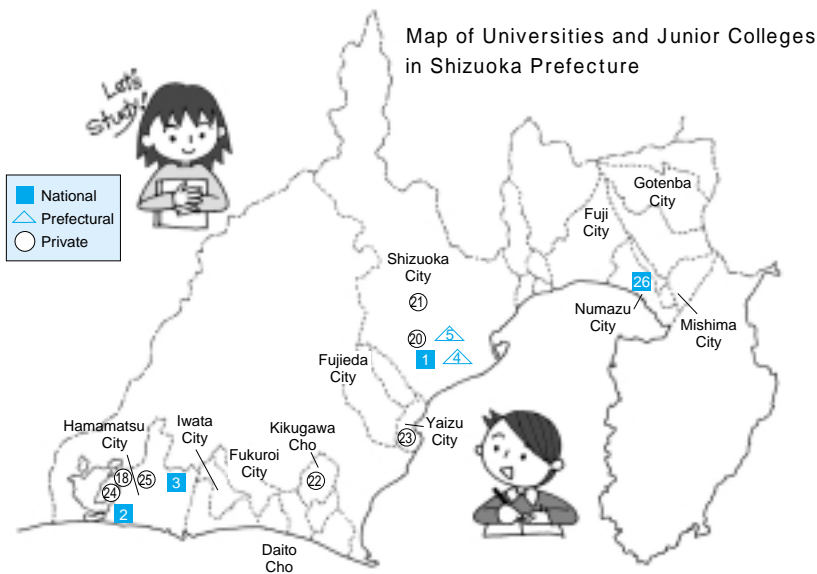
At university, apart from lectures, circle activities are popular among students. There are all kinds of groups, such as sports circles, cultural circles and other groups where like-minded people get together. Students grow close relationships with friends through these circle activities. Moreover, joining in the circle activities is a chance to meet with other university students. That makes student life enriching in a different aspect from studies. It is recommended that students find and join a circle they're interested in.

Admission for foreign students:

The admission policy for foreign students varies with each university and sometimes it may change every year. Some universities do not admit foreign students and some do not have an admission policy. Even at universities that admit foreign students, some require exactly the same entrance examination as

for the Japanese students; some consider the marks after the same entrance exam as that of the Japanese students. Selecting them after consideration of their marks makes it almost impossible for foreign students to enter those universities. For foreign students, universities with special selection methods would be a better choice. In case there is a special selection method, the date of examination, enrollment deadline and subject for the examination varies with each university, so students need to find out the details in advance.

Some universities charge about the same amount in admission fees and tuition fees, as for Japanese students, while some only charge half the amount. After entering university, if students have difficulty paying the tuition fees for some unavoidable circumstances, they should apply for remission of school fees. Some universities remit half or all of fees after screening the students' school record and economic situation. There are many types of scholarship programmes for foreign students sponsored by the university, prefecture and nation. Contents of application and the number of applicants admitted may change each year. Please ask for more information at each university.

The Goodwill Ambassador of Fuji no Kuni is a private ambassador. Since 1995, the prefectural governor entrusts the task to foreign students in Shizuoka Prefecture. They are expected to be a bridge between the “Fuji no Kuni, Shizuoka Prefecture” and the world. They participate in international exchange events such as seminars for the youth, school visits, seminars on current foreign affairs, give cooking lessons and introduce their native folk dances. The purpose of these events are to introduce the culture of their native countries and promote friendship with people in Shizuoka. After they go back to their country, they are expected to actively share information about Shizuoka to the people of their country and maintain close contact with Shizuoka Prefecture.

## 6.Information for Foreign Students

Foreign students studying in Japan in general are called “ ryugaku-sei ” but the term is differentiated by the educational institution they belong to.

College Student: Foreign students enrolled at junior college, university, graduate school, technical college and vocational school are classified into two groups. One is on a government scholarship and is invited by scholarship of Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology. The other one is by private means. Their status of residence is “ College Student. ”

Pre-College Student: Foreign students studying in Japanese Language Schools or various Japanese schools have the status of “ Pre-College Student. ” When they are admitted to university, they must change their status from “ Pre-College student ” to “ College student. ”

“ Japanese Language Proficiency Test ”

It is a test for non-native Japanese speakers to measure their ability and proficiency and receive authorization in the Japanese Language. This examination is held in December. There are 4 levels from 1 to 4. This system of assessment is adopted by many universities and junior colleges to select for foreign students entering by private means. Usually, level 1 or 2 are required for applicants to gain entry.

“ Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students ” (Nihon ryugaku shiken)

This examination was put in place from 2002, to evaluate the Japanese language ability of foreign students who wish to enter university, graduate school, junior college or technical college in Japan. The examination is held twice a year, in June and November. This examination can also be taken from selected countries overseas. There are two different types of exams, for the Sciences and Humanities. Universities all over the country are now considering how to incorporate this examination into their system for selecting foreign students.

#### The Sciences

Japanese:Examines the Japanese ability to keep up with studies at a Japanese university.

Science:Examines the knowledge in fundamental science (physics, chemistry, biology) to keep up with the studies at the Natural Science Department at a Japanese university.

Mathematics:Examines the knowledge in fundamental mathematics to keep up with studies at a Japanese university.

#### The Humanities

Japanese:Examines the Japanese ability to keep up with studies at a Japanese university.

General Subjects:Examines the knowledge in the fundamentals of humanities subjects to keep up with the studies at a Japanese university. Questions are taken comprehensively from Civics, Geography and History.

Questions are written in both Japanese and English, except for the subject of Japanese. Some universities (schools) designate only one language. Applicants can state which language they will use in the examination when they send in the application form.

## 7. Japanese Language Schools and Courses for Foreigners

### Japanese Language Schools

Among the many foreign students who come to Japan, very few have studied the language and come with pre-arranged admission into universities or graduate schools. The majority generally begin learning Japanese after they arrive, and then apply for entrance examination to university or graduate

school. After they pass this, they are admitted to the school. Consequently, studying at a Japanese Language School is an important key to determining their future. Therefore, it is important to choose the appropriate language school that matches their Japanese ability with careful consideration to their future plans.
